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

Team Snapshots

The 2023-2024 academic year was a remarkable one for the Office of Sustainability, with our largest student employee team yet, comprising of 16 dedicated students across 6 diverse teams. Their hard work and passion for sustainability have driven impactful projects and initiatives across campus. The following pages highlight the contributions of each team, showcasing the meaningful work they do to advance sustainability at Colorado College. From community engagement to hands-on projects, these students have played a vital role in shaping CC to be a model for sustainability.

The Administrative Assistant team is essential to the Office of Sustainability, providing vital behind-the-scenes support year-round. This team is integral to the smooth functioning of our office, handling a diverse range of administrative responsibilities. This includes overseeing the sustainability email and ensuring that initiatives, programs, and events are effectively communicated across the college. Taking charge of planning office events, ensuring that gatherings and activities run seamlessly. Additionally, this team is an important link between in-office teams and facilitates coordination between our office and other departments/offices. Their role also extends to managing our e-waste program and properly disposing of unwanted electronic waste. Furthermore, they are always ready to take on additional tasks, demonstrating their adaptability and dedication to supporting the office's operations.



Team Highlights

- Event Planning Success: The Administrative Assistant team was responsible for organizing 4 internal office events, including the Meet and Greet, Winter Dinner, Spring Revival, and End-of-Year Celebration. This required the coordination of reserving event spaces, procuring catering, and planning activities during the event for the entire office.
- Managing the E-Waste Collection: Over the course of that year, the team organized 4 e-waste drop-off events. More than 100 CC community members participated in these drop-off events, responsibly disposing of their e-waste. These gatherings reduced the necessity for individual ewaste pickups, increasing the accessibility and efficiency of the program. Working with E-Tech Recyclers, over 21,000 lbs. of e-waste was collected that year.
- Earth Week Support: During spring, the Administrative Assistant team played a vital role in communicating and publicizing Earth Week events happening across the college hosted by other offices, departments, and clubs. This involved working with campus partners to obtain event details and graphics for the Earth Week webpage, ensuring timely updates and accuracy.



Team Highlights

- Fall Data Collection & Spring Review: Throughout the fall semester, the team systematically gathers data from stakeholders across various college offices. This data spans five main areas: Academics, Engagement, Operations, Planning & Administration, and Innovation, totaling over 65 credits with numerous data points, making it a substantial undertaking. This spring, the STARS team implemented a rigorous internal review process for each data point collected by students and staff within the OOS to ensure accuracy and relevance. The college maintains its gold standing for the ninth consecutive year.
- UCCS Collaboration: For the first time since reporting to the STARS® platform, the Office of Sustainability collaborated with the University of Colorado Colorado Spring's Office of Sustainability for a peer review. This included independent auditors from both institutions reviewing the data entered into the platform, followed by multiple rounds of edits to ensure adherence to best practices prior to official submission.

- Collaborated with HR to create and produce a Sustainability Orientation Video





The Emissions Intern team is tasked with annually tracking CC's greenhouse gas emissions. The Emissions team collects, organizes, and calculates emissions with guidance from the Sustainability Director. These emissions stem from various sources including direct emissions from combustion and business travel, as well as associated emissions from purchased electricity, food sourcing, and student commuting. Additionally, this team focuses on cultivating a culture of sustainable transportation across the college. Working to spread awareness for Mountain Metro, increase engagement with PikeRide and bicycle programming, and develop the OOS voluntary travel offset program.






Carbon: 2023

The Waste team in the OOS is dedicated to implementing a diverse array of waste programming and educational initiatives across campus, aiming to enhance understanding and improve waste management practices. Through various projects and initiatives, they strive to decode the intricacies of waste at CC, identifying key areas for improvement. The team's primary objectives include reducing waste generation campus-wide and increasing waste diversion into proper streams for recycling and composting. By collaborating with students, faculty, and staff, the team endeavors to foster a culture of environmental stewardship and responsible waste management within CC.

Team Highlights

- Plant Library Program: The Plant Library aims to educate students about the benefits of houseplants and promote their propagation across CC's residential spaces. Launched as a pilot in spring 2024 and officially introduced in fall 2024 by Rennie '24, the Waste Team hosted two plant exchange pop-up events during the year, distributing a total of 29 plants to students.
- I Don't Know Bin Campaign: The "I Don't Know Bin" campaign, introduced this year, provides a solution for individuals unsure of where to properly dispose of their trash by encouraging them to use a designated bin. Through audits conducted in the Big 3 Dorm, the Waste team identified the top five items causing diversion confusion:
 - napkins and paper towels
 - paper
 - plastic bottles and containers
 - snack bags and wrappers
 - food and liquid waste

The team plans on conducting targeted educational programs for the upcoming year with this data. As a pilot project initiated during the spring semester, the team is looking forward to refining and scaling the campaign for improved waste diversion across campus.


The CC Exchange is dedicated to advancing sustainability and equity for students by offering a space to recirculate goods such as clothing, books, household items, and more, all at no cost. The goal of this program is to minimize waste and enhance waste diversion on campus. We achieve this by partnering with community members both on and off-campus, and by creating a space that supports students' well-being by addressing their basic needs and beyond. Located in Worner Campus Center, the CC Exchange is open to the community for donations and operates weekly on Thursdays. As a dynamic and adaptable initiative within the Office of Sustainability, the CC Exchange is committed to making a positive impact on campus and in the wider community.



Program & Project Recap

- Partnered with Residential Experience to collect 50 lbs of unclaimed clothing from the laundry room in Hybl Community Center
- Teamed up with the Career Center for a professional attire drive, resulting in over 200 lbs. of clothing donated
- Organized pop-up events in collaboration with CC Arts & Crafts, CCSGA, and the Butler Center for Goth Prom in the fall, and with the OOS Waste Team in spring, with a total of 240 student participants across both events and multiple days
- Donated more than 235 lbs. of items from the CC Exchange to Springs Rescue Mission, Terracycle, and local thrift stores
- Supported the Queer and Trans Collective by opening the CC Exchange monthly for Transition Closet gatherings through the Butler Center
- Distributed dorm items to incoming students in partnership with Residential Experience and International Student Orientation
- Continued the Craft Nook with Who Gives a Scrap
- Hosted the CC Pantry Exchange Service Day for the 2nd year in a row with the HVE/Best Buddies Club
- Hosted Sustainable Wednesdays in Worner Campus Center


CC Exchange Team Continued

CC Exchange Donation Log



PikeRide & Mountain Metro

CC offers free PikeRide and Mountain Metro memberships to students through the Office of Sustainability. Last year, over 29,830 trips were taken, covering 43,626 miles on PikeRide bikes!





CC Farm & Greenhouse

The Office of Sustainability oversees the CC Farm & Greenhouse and advises the CC Student Farm Club in managing weekly operations, growing food, and engagement with the community.





Sense of Place: CO Water Tour

Students (19) and staff (2) joined the office, in partnership with Colorado Springs Utilities, to explore Colorado's water infrastructure, including reservoirs, pipelines, and pump stations that supply Colorado Springs over Block 1 break.



Earth Week

Every April, the college celebrates Earth Week with a week-long, multi-office event featuring activities like Trash Peak, Arbor Day, Pride Outside, and more!





Volunteer Program

The Office of Sustainability onboarded 13 year-long volunteers who supported student teams and assisted with projects like the CC Exchange, data review, and researching waste alternatives, serving over 170+ hours throughout the year.

Sustainable Wednesdays

Sustainable Wednesdays is a fun, interactive series of pop-up events that engage students on sustainability topics with tips, resources, and peer-to-peer discussions. In FY24, six events led by each student team engaged with 158 students.

Ditch the Dumpster

Ditch the Dumpster is CC's annual move-out donation program. Last year, over 10,000 lbs. of items were donated in 8 days, with 56 students, staff, and faculty sorting and distributing donations across campus and the community.

NSO Engagement

In partnership with the CCE and Bike COS, 20 incoming students were lead on a PikeRide bike tour to explore Colorado Springs, helping them familiarize themselves with the city and key campus locations they might visit during their time at CC.
