Madeleine Tucker Studies Ecology and Conservation in Tanzania

I was fortunate to receive financial aid to travel to Tanzania for a CC course during 6th block and spring break of this year. It was my first time traveling to Africa, and it was an unforgettable experience. We spent the majority of the month on safari in the country's national parks, but we also spent some time in the capital city, Arusha, and visited Maasai and Hadzabe villages.

We arrived in Arusha after a long couple of days of transit. We stayed for three days in the city before driving to the Maasai village of Agykeret. For me, that was the most memorable portion of the trip. I loved spending time with the Maasai people and learning from them about their culture, as well as examining the plants of the region. We took part in one of their sacrificial ceremonies-called "Orpul," in which a goat is killed, cooked, and eaten on the spot. We also spent time with the Hadzabe. We played a gambling game with them, and they sang us many of their traditional songs. From there, we began our circuit of the national parks. In about three weeks we were able to make it to many of the parks in the northern part of the state - including Ngorogoro Crater, Lake Manyara, Serengeti, and Tarangire National Parks. In visiting these places, we were exposed to a diversity of ecosystems, and the huge variety of flora and fauna they contained. We saw lions, cheetahs, and leopards in the Serengeti, hippos in Lake Manyara, and elephants in Tarangire. While we traveled, we learned about current conservation issues in the places we visited, and often ended our days with discussions of these topics. It was incredible to be in a place so entirely unfamiliar, where everything was new and there was so much to learn every day. I am so lucky to have had this experience, and am hugely grateful to the WES program for making it possible for me!

Melissa Manuel Studies The Odyssey in Greece

Since fifth grade when my teacher read me Percy Jackson's The Lightning Thief by Rick Riordan, I have loved Greek mythology and dreamed of visiting Greece. When I learned that CC offered a study abroad class that went to Greece and included studying Homer's The Odyssey, it sounded perfect. There was no way I was missing this opportunity, and through the graciousness of the Study Abroad Office, Film and Media Studies Department, and the wonderful women at WES I was able to afford the trip. And so on May 23 of 2018 my very own Odyssey began in Athens.

Athens is a big city where buildings are all squished together, stacked and twisted around in no particular order. Graffiti covered almost everything and it all wound around crumbling remains of Greek history that attracted tourists and seemed more of an inconvenience to Athenian citizens. We spent three days in Athens getting to know our classmates and our two professors Lisa Hughes and Barry Sarchett, who love Greece and The Odyssey in a way that can only be described as akin to Odysseus' love for Penelope. Everywhere we went Barry and Lisa had friends they've known for years and tavernas they particularly loved. It wasn't just a trip experiencing Greece through The Odyssey it was also a trip of experiencing Greece through their eyes.

From Athens we boarded a bus and headed to the Peloponnese with the destination of a small beachside town called Gythio right beside a rocky Mavrovouni Beach. Along the

way we got to stop and visit Agamemnon's Palace at Mycenae where the great Greek plays of The Oresteia are said to have taken place. The stone walls that have stood for hundreds of thousands of years still stood, which continues to baffle historians and archeologists as they remain together with no visible support.

Once we reached Gythio we arrived at our new home for the week, the Demestihas Apartments, owned by the loving, and incredibly kind Demestihas family. We had dinner at their taverna and they taught us to dance. In our week in the Peloponnese we had class every evening in the patio of the apartments trying to not get mauled by mosquitos and learning Greek history. We took a trip to the nearby Caves of Diros where it is believed Odysseus entered the Underworld. It was a breathtaking experience where we got rowed in boats through the cave as it was filled with water. After this we got a bonus experience being driven around the Mani of the Peloponnese for the rest of the day and got to appreciate the beautiful home of the Demestihas family and their friends.

When we had to leave Gythio it was heartbreaking having to say good-

bye to such a beautiful town and people. But there was so much more to do, and so back to Athens we went to board the boats that would be our home for the next two weeks. Mythos II and Kalikratis. From Athens we sailed the dark wine sea to the Cyclades, where we began reading The Odyssey, and every day was incredible (putting sea sickness aside in my case). My favorite island we visited was Paros; it was smaller and less touristy than its bigger neighbor Naxos. But to be brief, because I could go on for pages, my time in the Cyclades will forever remain close to me. Nothing really compares sailing the Aegean Sea following the story of Odysseus and just truly appreciating the history and complexity of this region, how it expanded across borders and how these histories helped shape the world we live in today.

After two weeks of sailing our trip was coming to a close, but of course it had to end in the same place as The Odyssey. We eventually reached the home of our hero: Ithaca. There are plenty of reasons Odysseus fought so hard to go home, but the beauty of Ithaca is definitely one, it is truly a sight to see. Lush and green, surrounded by the immaculate sea, it was beautiful beyond belief. Here we finished The Odyssey as a class and celebrated our Blue and White Banquet before heading our separate ways.

I am forever grateful for this chance to have spent a month in Greece and have learned the story of Odysseus and the ancient world of Greece he came from. It's one thing to travel to a new place, but it's another to travel to a new place and actually learn and appreciate what is around you.

BIRDING AND BEYOND: March 17-21

he hidden treasures of western and central Nebraska came alive thanks to Sharon Rice and Cathy Wilson-O'Donnell. Known for their research and insider information, while taking good care of travelers, the duo launched another successful fundraising adventure for WES and PILLAR.

We gathered before sunrise in blinds along the Platte River as majestic sandhill cranes awoke to feed and replenish energy reserves before continuing on to Canada, Alaska and Siberia. Each spring more than 600,000 cranes commune in the valley during their migration, one of North America's greatest. We also spotted white pelicans migrating at Harlan County Reservoir and laughed at prairie chicken dances outside McCook. We watched up close from inside converted horse trailers-fully carpeted, with padded chairs-as colorful males wooed indifferent females, running and stomping their feet while making booming sounds.

We uncovered small town treasures along the way: In Cozad, artist Robert Henri's childhood home and bizarre name-changing story; outside Kearney, the Archway Western History Museum over Interstate 80; and in Mind-

en, the Harold Warp Pioneer Museum with 50,000 artifacts. In Red Cloud we toured author Willa Cather's attic bedroom, covered in wallpaper she herself installed as a teen, and visited sites described in her novel, My Antonia (1918). The Red Cloud Post Office boasted Works Progress Administration murals by Archie Musick. Our Fine Arts Center displays this artist, and one of his murals still stands at the Manitou Springs Post Office. In McCook, we viewed the Frank Lloyd Wright Sutton house, the architect's only Nebraska creation. Eliza Sutton commissioned the six-bedroom home completed in 1908, showcasing Wright's Prairie Style.
