


Douglas Edlin is the McHugh Professor of American Institutions and Leadership at Colorado College. He holds a PhD from Oxford University and a JD from Cornell Law School. Professor Edlin is the author

of Common Law Judging (University of Michigan Press) and Judges and Unjust Laws (University of Michigan Press), and the editor of Common Law Theory (Cambridge University Press). His articles have appeared in *Jurisprudence*, the American Journal of Comparative Law, the Canadian Journal of Law and Jurisprudence, Polity, and other journals. Professor Edlin was a Fulbright Scholar at Queen Mary University of London, a MacCormick Fellow at the University of Edinburgh School of Law, and a Research Scholar at the University of Melbourne Law School Center for Comparative Constitutional Studies. Prior to returning to graduate school, he worked as a litigator and appeared before federal and state trial and appellate courts in New York, New Jersey, and Pennsylvania. Professor Edlin teaches courses on the courts, constitutional and comparative law, legal theory, and the history and politics of race in the US judicial system.

About this tour he says, "The program will examine the political dimension of the arts in Britain, with a focus on the performative and dramatic arts, as well as the artistic dimension of politics in Britain, with a focus on political/legal rhetoric, ritual, and ceremony. We will examine the degree to which politics in Britain pervades corresponding cultural institutions and practices, and the degree to which artistic modes of expression pervade British politics and law."

Dear Colorado College alumni and friends,

I invite you to join Dr. Douglas Edlin, McHugh Professor of American Institutions and Leadership, on this special trip through Cambridge, Oxford, and London, England. Professor Edlin received his PhD from Oxford University and has led numerous student groups to the region. He will introduce you to the political dimension of the arts in Britain, focusing on the performative and dramatic arts, as well as the artistic dimension of politics in Britain—especially rhetoric, ritual, and ceremony. This trip will help you see Britain through a different lens than you may have experienced before.

You will begin your trip by visiting two of the most well-known educational institutions in the world, Cambridge and Oxford Universities. Each counts many prominent political and artistic figures among its alumni. Along the way, you will take a walking tour of the historic university city of Cambridge, and enjoy an afternoon punting on the River Cam. Visit Blenheim Palace, birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill; and Oxford University's largest College, Christ Church College.

Spend four nights at a well-located hotel in central London, where we will explore a variety of sites together and you may also easily explore your own interests independently during our afternoons and evenings at leisure. Together we will take a cruise on the River Thames; visit (subject to availability) The Palace of Westminster and The British Library's Treasures Gallery; and tour Shakespeare's Globe (Theater) and the Supreme Court, where we may be able to attend a court session. While in London, you will have several opportunities to take in theater performances in the West End and at Shakespeare's Globe.

Professor Edlin will be joined by an expert tour manager/guide throughout the program, plus local guides and occasional guest speakers. What you see and learn with Professor Edlin will make this an unforgettable immersion into the arts and politics of Britain. 

Sunday, July 20, 2025: Depart home

Monday, July 21: Arrive London, England | Transfer to central London | Welcome dinner

Arrive at London's Heathrow Airport (LHR), where you will be met and transferred as a group (time TBD) to our hotel in central London. Enjoy the balance of the day at leisure before gathering for a welcome dinner. *Overnight at the 4-star Thistle London Holborn hotel.* (D)



Tuesday, July 22: Cambridge: Walking tour, King's College Chapel

Take a morning drive to Cambridge, and then set out on a walking tour of the university city. Cambridge is an attractive collection of grand buildings and vast green parks. Highlights include the beautiful, Gothic chapel of King's College; the Bridge of Sighs; and the ornate, 16th century Great Gate of St. John's College. We will learn about the history of the university; famous former students such as Darwin, Newton, and Hawking; and practical aspects of applying and studying there. After an independent lunch we will visit King's College Chapel for a self-guided tour. Founded in 1441 by King Henry VI, King's College is the oldest, and grew into the largest, college at prestigious Cambridge University. Over the centuries, the college educated some of the finest minds in literature, politics, and economics, including novelist E.M. Forster and economist John Maynard Keynes. The highlight of King's College is the late-Gothic King's Chapel, an ornate masterwork of English craftsmanship. When gazing upwards at the breathtaking fan-vault ceiling, beautiful stained-glass windows, and famous Baroque painter Rubens' Adoration of the Magi masterpiece, it's easy to see why it took more than a century to build. Check-in to our hotel and enjoy dinner at leisure. Two nights at the 4-star Clayton Hotel Cambridge. (B)

Wednesday, July 23: Ely: Ely Cathedral, Stained Glass Museum | Cambridge: Punting on the River Cam

This morning we take a short drive to Ely for a guided visit of the magnificent, 900-year-old Ely Cathedral, which dominates the skyline of this small but historically important city. Ely Cathedral began as a monastery set up by Queen Etheldreda in the 7th century, and over the centuries was a pilgrimage site to the Queen despite being destroyed and rebuilt as an abbey and eventually a cathedral in the 11th century. The highlight is a unique, octagonal, 14th century lantern tower—a real medieval marvel—but the 13th century quire and a 14th century Lady Chapel are also to be admired. Also, visit the fascinating Stained Glass Museum, where more than 125 stained glass panels tell the story of this unique art from the 13th century to present day. After an independent lunch, we return to Cambridge and enjoy an afternoon punting the River Cam, a local pastime that was introduced at the start of the 20th century. While relaxing in a traditional Cambridge punt (a long boat with a flat bottom that is propelled forward by a punter, who pushes a pole against the river bed), take in the beautiful view of the "Backs" of the iconic colleges that make up the University of Cambridge. The balance of the day and dinner are at leisure. (B)

Thursday, July 24: Woodstock: Blenheim Palace | Oxford: Christ Church College

Check out of our hotel this morning and drive to Oxford, first stopping at Blenheim Palace, a country house in Woodstock. Blenheim is a masterpiece of Baroque architecture and was home to the 12th century Duke of Marlborough. It is also the birthplace of Sir Winston Churchill and a UNESCO World Heritage Site. We will enter the palace and explore the gilded state rooms and priceless collections set against striking stonework. Continue to Oxford where, after an independent lunch, we visit Christ Church College, the largest college of Oxford University, one of the world's most prestigious

universities. With more than 500 years of history, Christ Church has produced historical greats like John Wesley, Robert Peel, William Gladstone, and 13 British Prime Ministers. It also makes an appearance in the *Harry Potter* films, where the College's Great Hall was replicated as Hogwarts Hall. Continue on to our hotel to checkin and gather for dinner. *Overnight at the 4-star voco Oxford Spires Hotel*. (B,D)


Friday, July 25: Surrey: Hampton Court Palace | London: PM at leisure, Optional theater performance

This morning we leave Oxford and begin our journey to London, stopping at Hampton Court Palace along the way. Hampton Court was built in the 16th century as a residence for Cardinal Thomas Wolsey, until he fell out of favor with Henry VIII. Then it fell into the hands of the monarchy. After centuries of rebuilding, a stately palace was created with a beautiful mix of Tudor and Baroque styles. The world-renowned gardens are the main attraction, with 750 acres of formal gardens and parkland on the banks of the River Thames. Continue on to London and check-in to our hotel. The balance of the day and dinner are at leisure. You have the option to attend a theater performance this evening (at additional cost). *Four nights at the 4-star Thistle London Holborn hotel*. (B)

Saturday, July 26: London: The Palace of Westminster, Cruise on the River Thames, Shakespeare's Globe, PM at leisure, Optional theater performance

This morning we visit (subject to availability) The Palace of Westminster, a UNESCO World Heritage Site and the meeting place of the Houses of Parliament. The Palace is an excellent example of neo-Gothic architecture and home to the tower, clock, and bell that are commonly known as Big Ben. After a cruise on the River Thames, from Westminster Pier to Tower Pier, we stop to enjoy an

independent lunch in Borough Market. This afternoon we visit Shakespeare's Globe, a recreation of The Globe Theatre, London's first purpose-built playhouse, which stood on a nearby site from 1576 to 1644. The original theater was partowned by William Shakespeare and staged many of his performances. Like many of England's theaters, it was closed by the Puritans in 1642 before being demolished in 1644. In 1949, American writer and director Sam Wanamaker visited London and set up the Shakespeare Globe Trust, which started a clamor to reopen this famous venue. In



Sunday, July 27: London: Panoramic tour of London, The British Library, PM at leisure

This morning we take a panoramic driving tour of London, viewing the iconic landmarks and cultural diversity of the city and stopping for short walks and photo opportunities along the way. We will see The Houses of Parliament, Big Ben, Westminster Abbey, Buckingham Palace, Trafalgar Square, Nelson's Column, and the Marble Arch. Continue on to visit The British Library's Treasures Gallery, which is home to the Magna Carta, pages from one of Leonardo da Vinci's notebooks, Shakespeare's First Folio, and more. Enjoy the balance of the day at leisure in London. (B)

Monday, July 28: London: National Portrait Gallery, The Supreme Court, Farewell dinner, Optional theater performance

This morning we visit the National Portrait Gallery, the world's first national public gallery dedicated to portraits. The Gallery houses portraits based on the significance of the sitter rather than of the artist. One of the best-known portraits is the Chandos portrait, which is the most famous portrait of William Shakespeare. After an independent lunch, we take a tour of The Supreme Court and perhaps have the opportunity to attend a court session (subject to availability). The Supreme Court is the final court of appeal in the United Kingdom for all civil cases, and for criminal cases originating in England, Wales, and Northern Ireland. We gather for an early farewell dinner at a local restaurant. You might choose to take in one more theater performance this evening (at additional cost). (B,D)

Tuesday, July 29: Fly home

Transfer as a group this morning to London's Heathrow Airport (LHR) for flights homeward. (B)





Optional: A Night Out at the Theater



During our four-night stay in London (Friday, July 25–Monday, July 28, 2025), you will have three opportunities to attend evening theater performances in the company of Professor Edlin. These performances will help fuel discussions introduced by Professor Edlin as part of our tour's underlying theme of examining how the political dimension of the arts in Britain play out onstage. Further, they are sure to be unforgettable evenings of camaraderie, entertainment, and fun!

Once the performance schedules are released, we will notify you which theaters and shows are options for Friday, Saturday, and Monday evenings. Our hope is that we will be able to sample several plays in several different locations. One of the plays will be at Shakespeare's Globe, which we visit on Saturday, July 26th, but the others could be in the West End or at the National Theater, the Theatre Royal Stratford East, or smaller venues.

Stay tuned for more information on cost, which theaters have been chosen, and which productions will be available.

As for Sunday, July 27th, Sunday evening is when the theater in London is traditionally dark, but you may find some matinee and early evening performances available. We have left that Sunday afternoon free for you to pursue individual interests, which may include an additional theater performance.

What to Expect



MODERATE: Must be able to walk one to three miles per day on mostly flat, but often uneven, terrain.

You must be able to make long walks, unassisted, over uneven terrain and up and down steps. Some sites require strenuous and/or brisk walking or climbing, sometimes with difficult footing. Participants who are not able to walk or stand unassisted for extended periods are kindly advised not to join this tour. All participants are expected to be physically active and not be an impediment to others on excursions, to enjoy traveling as part of a group, and to be ready to experience cultural differences. All participants will be required to follow safety/sanitization protocols set forth by Sponsors/ Operator, local staff, and host country laws. Any participant showing signs of illness will be asked to wear a mask when in close proximity to others. If the tour manager decides that a participant cannot visit a site safely or in a timely manner, their judgment will be final. Where possible, an alternate activity may be suggested; additional costs may apply. If you have any questions about your ability to participate, we suggest that you visit your personal physician with this brochure in hand and discuss whether or not this program is appropriate for you. Hotels have been chosen for their excellent locations and generous comfort. Included meals are of a very high quality. At the time of year we visit the weather is pleasant, with the average temperatures ranging from the low 60s F at night to the low- to mid-70s F during the day. There is always a chance for moderate rainfall and participants should come prepared for some wet weather. Complete pre-departure details will be sent to participants.

We do not accept any liability for cancellation penalties related to domestic or international airline tickets.

Prices Do Not Include: Airfare from/to home; passport and visa fees; airport fees and departure taxes; cost of personal, trip cancellation, and baggage insurance; transportation of excess baggage; meals and beverages other than those indicated; personal tips; items of a personal nature such as medical expenses, laundry, taxi, telephone, and fax charges; optional excursions or deviations from scheduled tour; other items not listed as included.
